The Amerika Samoa Choir

The "Aufaipese a Amerika Samoa" is comprised of thirty four musically talented individuals from American Samoa who are from different social, religious, vocational background, and age groups. The common factor that ties them all together is their love for music, specifically singing.

The "Aufaipese a Amerika Samoa" will be performing both traditional and contemporary Samoan choral music composed and/or rearranged by individuals that were either born, raised, worked and/or raised a family in American Samoa. Some performed pieces commemorate an important event in the lives of the people of American Samoa; while other songs remind us of our early childhood. Lastly, a couple of pieces will showcase the skill and versatility of the "Aufaipese a Amerika Samoa."






















Heritage Dance

Led by the talented Tautai Loso Iaulualo, along with dance instructors Noelle Mageo (female group) and Eti Eti (male group), the Amerika Samoa Dance Group will be performing at this year's Pacific Arts Festival. The ensemble has prepared three 25-minutes performances: a Traditional set, a Contemporary set, and a Mix incorporating elements of both, enhanced by the mesmerizing Fire Dance.

The performance begins with a greeting song, introducing dance as both protocol and entertainment among Samoans. This opening highlights the importance of coordination in movements, exemplified by the sāsā or slap dance.

Following the greeting song and dance, the *Mauluulu* is presented, a series of songs praising villages like Lauli'i, Sa'ilele, Fagasa, Pago Pago, and Leone, celebrating their uniqueness and history.

Next is the sāsā, requiring quick coordination for synchronized 'body slapping' movements, followed by the traditional knife dance, *Ailao* or *Nifo* 'Oti, historically performed by warriors. In the 1960s, Freddie Olo Letuli added fire, creating the dramatic Fire Knife Dance or *Ailao Afi*, now performed worldwide.

The performance concludes with a farewell song, reflecting on the shared experience and showcasing the unique beauty of the Samoan culture.





Siapo

Fourth Generation Siapo maker Reggie Meredith Fitiao of Leone Village, AS will be teaming up with siapo makers Faitoto'a Nicholas King, Puataunofo Tofaeono, Deliah Paopao, and Su'a Uilisone Fitiao to showcase both methods of siapo making which include Siapo mamanu or freehand design and siapo tasiga which is the rubbing method. The Siapo team plan to do daily demonstrations of bark beating, elei, and other things using natural materials while working on completing a siapo mamanu at the Festival Village.







Regina Meredith is leading the team of talented artists from American Samoa to this year's Pacific Festival (FESTPac) in Hawaii. Accompanying Ms. Regina are renowned artists Ms. Puataunofo Tofaeono, Ms. Deliah Paopao, and Mr. Nicholas King Jr. They will be showcasing their talents through various mediums including painting and siapo/tapa making.

Visual Arts

American Samoa's visual arts blend tradition with modern expression. Each work reflects Samoan identity, perserving heritage while exploring contemporary themes. Representing American Samoa at the 13th Pacific Arts Festival are **Talanoa Lagafuaina** and **Tasi Sunia**.







Film, New Media

Tulaga Whitcombe and Gabby Faaiuaso have both been working on separate short films which they have submitted to the Film Fest Organizers, who happen to be Pacific Islanders in Communications in Hawaii. Plans for our AS filmmakers is to give them time to mingle with others in the trade, showcase and present their work as representatives of AS, and grab some footage during the Festival that describes their vision of what FestPAC looked like from the lens' point of view.





Tulaga Witcombe, a talented cinematographer, graphic designer, editor, and music producer with over 10 years of experience, submitted a short film to present at the Pacific Arts Festival. This film is a visual interpretation of a poem by Tamiano J. Gurr about his experiences growing up as a half-caste Pacific Islander in American Samoa. It explores his feelings of disconnect, being labeled "palagi" by his community, and his journey to acceptance in Hawaii.


Daniel Whitcombe


