Samoan Heritage Week Concludes with Annual ELLA Scholarship Gala



On Saturday, June 21, 2024, the Samoa Heritage Week concluded with a Gala celebration at the Ala Moana Hotel. The event was dedicated to the future generation of Samoans and highlighted the many Samoan military families residing abroad. It showcased the Samoan community's commitment to nurturing cultural heritage and traditions, emphasizing the importance of education, resilience, and the spirit of giving back.

Ms. Felea'i Tau, Community Relief Liaison for the Office of the Governor - Hawaii, delivered the keynote address at the evening's Samoan Heritage Gala. The theme of her speech was 'identity'. Felea'i Tau highlighted the importance of community service after achieving personal goals: "I urge you, once you've accomplished your goals, whether becoming a doctor, a lawyer, or pursuing any other aspiration, to consider giving back to Samoa and American Samoa. There's a critical shortage in our healthcare professions and across various fields. Remember, being Samoan carries the responsibility of contributing to the well-being of your community."

The First Lady's Scholarship initiative, called E LELEI LE ALOFA O LE ATUA (ELLA), aims to promote higher learning. This scholarship provides recipients with the financial means to study at a 2- or 4-year accredited college of their choice. Scholarships worth \$1,000 each were awarded to 25 deserving recipients.

Recipients were selected based on their essays, which emphasized the value of Samoan treasures, showcased appreciation for the language and culture, and addressed community challenges.
